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Suggested interview questions for Anne Newton Walther author of LOSS OF INNOCENCE: A Novel of the French Revolution

- 1. Your gripping new novel, *Loss of Innocence* (Tapestries Publishing; July 14, 2007), continues the story of Eugénie Devereux, the lovely and courageous French countess you introduced in your highly praised historical fiction debut, *A Time for Treason*, seven years ago. When you finished your first novel, did you have a clear vision of Eugénie's next adventure? Or did it take you awhile to work out the details of your heroine's comeback?
- 2. What drew you to the daunting subject of the French Revolution?
- 3. Your novel features a coalition of Americans and French nobility with an ambitious plan to save Marie Antoinette and the French monarchy. How did you learn about this little-known, historically-documented movement? What is Azilum?
- 4. How did you gain insight into the true character of Marie Antoinette? Did you come to see her as a tragic victim of politics—or bad publicity?
- 5. Like your previous novel, *Loss of Innocence* includes many real-life figures among its cast of characters. What is most challenging—and fun—about interweaving factual characters with fictitious ones?
- 6. Speaking of factual characters, is Bridger Goodrich based on an actual person? Who was he and how did you come across him?
- 7. What inspired you to make Roan II, a horse, a pivotal player in the novel's action?
- 8. What qualities make Eugénie an extraordinary woman for her times?
- 9. Do you have any plans on the horizon for Eugénie's return?
- 10. What do you most enjoy about writing historical romances? Do you have any advice for writers aspiring to break into the genre?
